Welcome to the 5th Oxford Interdisciplinary Desert Conference!

The first Desert Conference was organized 11 years ago and inaugurated a new forum to bring together a highly diverse and international group of scholars and practitioners. The Desert Conference is now a tradition, sprouting up every 2 or 3 years. In 2018 a mini Desert Conference was organized in Almaty, Kazakhstan at Kazakh National University, in part funded by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals programme. Through the series three books and one journal special issue have originated at the conferences. These are matched by new research partnerships, dryland agendas and enduring friendships.

We very much hope to continue the Desert Conference into the future and encourage its replication in new places and with new people.
